



Key Recommendations From Report

- Move to mandatory sustainable public procurement with mandatory targets to demonstrate role model leadership and foster harmonization across the provinces, territories, and broader public sector.
- Remove silos and adopt a comprehensive view of public procurement to move from an economistic view of public procurement toward a "whole-ofgovernment" approach that prioritizes emissions reductions, circularity, Indigenous businesses, and ending forced labour in supply chains.
- Reduce regulatory fragmentation and foster multi-level government collaboration, rewarding provincial policy coherence, strategic alignment of procurement policies, inclusion of sustainable procurement requirements within intergovernmental funding and transfer payment agreements.
- Create a centralized knowledge hub and open access data repository through a centralized data collection and stewardship system to foster continuous peer-to-peer learning, document best-practices, and allow for an evidenced-based approach to future policy improvements.
- Conduct a Methodology for Assessing Procurement Systems (MAPS) audit to set a transparent benchmark and establish accountability towards desired objectives and outcomes.
- Stimulate and reward responsible business conduct and supply chain transparency by requiring and/or rewarding full supply chain transparency in publicly funded contracts.





Government of Canada Initiative on Forced Labor and Social Procurement

"A Call to Action: Ending the Use of All Forms of Child Labour in Supply Chains" Report was prepared by the Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs and International Development in 2018.

Proposed Supply Chain Legislation

- Would requires businesses to report and/or take measures to prevent some or all human and/or labour rights violations at any stage of the business
- can regulate a business' domestic activities and any activities that take place abroad,
- and can include subsidiary businesses or suppliers

Sustainable Procurement and Supply Chain

Sustainable Procurement ensures that buyers...

- ...obtain the best value for money, when purchasing... (i.e., best value means counting all the costs of the goods or services including end of life, not just the initial purchase price)
- ... the most sustainable goods and services... (i.e., products that have the best environmental and social performance and content attributes)
- ...from the most sustainable suppliers, in support of... (i.e. suppliers that have the best impacts on the environment, their employees, and their communities, directly or indirectly)
- the organization's stated purpose and strategic goals. (i.e., the organization cares about its impacts on people and the planet and accepts mutual accountability for indirect im-pacts by its supply chains.



Main priorities of procurement organizations 2019 vs. 2021






SCOPE 3 EMISSIONS - SUBCATEGORIES BY INDUSTRY

Civil society organizations and labour organizations in Canada strongly supported introducing broad due diligence legislation that would:

- cover all human rights, including labour rights
- require businesses to disclose information on their practices to address human rights abuses and labour exploitation, and
- require them to address these issues

Supply Chain Engagement

Tools for Engaging with suppliers on Sustainability

Partnership

Support supplier ownership to address the root causes of pool sustainability performance

Remediation & Capacity Building

Ask suppliers to address issues of poor performance. Provide training, resources, and support to improve sustainability management and performance

Monitoring & Audits


Ask suppliers to self-assess their sustainability performance

Setting Expectation

Communicate about your sustainability expectations to suppliers, incorporate expectations, including the code of conduct, into contracts
